## FROM OUR PRESIDENT

### Reading in winter inspires action in summer

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Earlier this year, in the cold month of February, I read *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle*, by Barbara Kingsolver. This book had been on my nightstand for some time before I finally read it, and I thought it was fascinating. She leads the reader through a year of her family's efforts to eat locally grown and produced foods, either from their garden or within a small radius of their home.

They are fortunate, as are we, to live in a region where small organic farms and locally produced items such as eggs, cheese, meats, nuts and grains are actually available. Their experiment in Virginia takes them from sparse eating options in the month of February through the abundance of the harvest season when fresh produce and fruits are everywhere. The challenges and rewards of their year of eating locally are described with rich detail, charm, cheer, reverence for nature and some hard data.



The book provides detailed information, but it is also a wonderful family story and even includes recipes. The Kingsolver family's decision to involve themselves with the food they eat provides a strong lesson in how the deliberate choices we make affect the ecosystems of the earth. We cannot all adopt this approach exclusively, but the take-away messages are timeless: sustainable organic agriculture makes sense; purchase as many locally grown or produced products as possible; grow your own fruits and vegetables if you can; and do not use poisons to kill unwanted living things.

"Animal, Vegetable, Miracle" helped me mentally prepare for the growing season.

Gardeners always fantasize about the garden in the winter and make plans, some of which work out and some of which do not! I plan to plant my regular kitchen garden this year, but I also want to support the local farmers that sell nuts, eggs and other products from our local area. These items are fresher, and the organic farming practices help the earth, the insects, the birds, the fish, and even us! We need to use our purchasing power to get products that are healthy for the whole network of life. Our local options are terrific, with farmers markets, farm stands and farms you can visit to make purchases helping to keep the local economy healthy as well. I hope to see you at the farmers market!

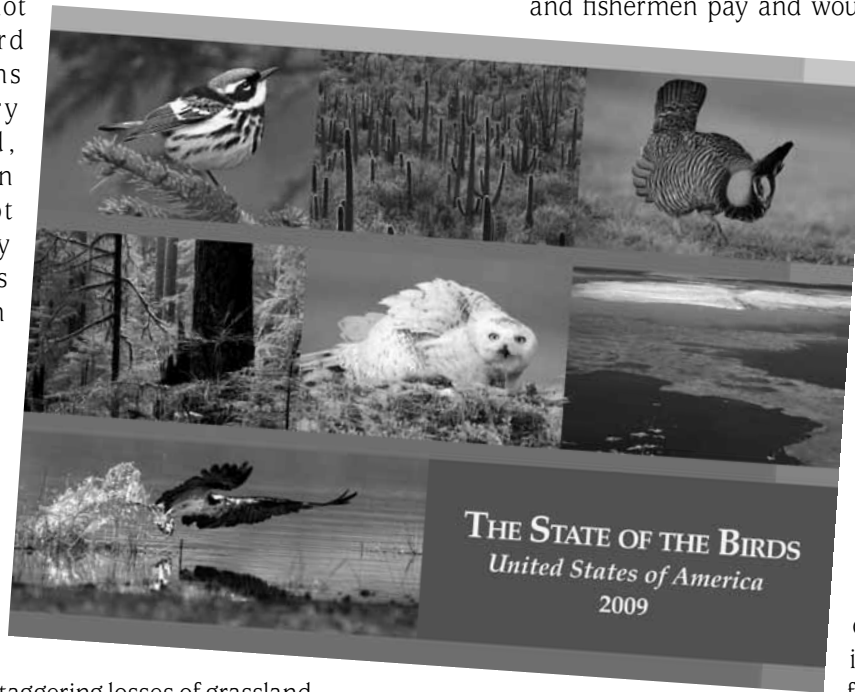
“The State of the Birds”

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This spring, the Secretary of the Interior released a report, “The State of the Birds”, which analyzed trends in bird populations across the United States. The overall picture is not good; over a third of bird populations across the country are endangered, threatened or in grave decline. Not only do healthy bird populations boast their own inherent value, but, additionally, they are significant indicators of the health of the environment we share. This should be a wake-up call to all of us; conservation efforts are needed without delay.



The report describes staggering losses of grassland and arid-land birds, species native to Hawaii, species dependent on the ocean, and many forest dwelling birds. However, there have been success stories, as well, of species targeted for special conservation efforts such as the peregrine falcon and of wetland species and hunted waterfowl in general. It is no coincidence that the recovery of these populations was dependent on money targeted for conservation efforts. In the case of many waterfowl, that money has come mostly from license fees and equipment taxes paid by hunters and fishermen.

The Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) is responsible for the conservation of wildlife in the state. Non-game species account for 88% of the species they are charged with protecting, but these species receive less than 2% of the funding. The majority of funds is for management of game species which come through a 10% tax on hunting and fishing equipment and license fees.

**A proposal to fund conservation efforts**

The Oregon Conservation Strategy is a nationally recognized plan for management of non-game species in our state, but there is no source of funding. Some organizations such

as Portland Audubon Society are proposing a sales tax on bird seed to help fund the Conservation Strategy. The bird seed sales tax would be similar to the tax that hunters and fishermen pay and would bring funding and influence to non-game conservation programs.

The bill appears to have many advantages. The small number of birdseed distributors would make the sales tax relatively easy to implement at the wholesale level. The largest birdseed seller in the state, Backyard Birdshops, is promoting passage of legislation to implement the funding. The amount of money paid by individuals would be small but state-wide would generate two million dollars a year, which would be matched by federal funding to produce 4-6 million dollars. The bill being proposed in the state legislature would expire in five years, so it can be actively opposed if it is not being used correctly.

Recent statistics show that the number of people who engage in wildlife viewing is now greater than the number of people who hunt and fish. Commendably, hunters and fishermen have been paying a tax to support their species of interest for decades and, as a result, leverage a great deal of influence on management strategy. Perhaps it is time for bird enthusiasts concerned about the state of all birds to have a way to help and be heard. I can buy a lot of bird seed for 20 bucks and would personally be gratified to know that a small amount of that money will support habitat for birds and promote wildlife viewing. None of us like taxes. But wouldn't it be nice to turn an old adage on its head: two birds in the bush are worth more than one in the hand.

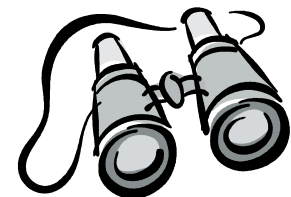

### WOODPECKERS IN THE SISTERS AREA

Were you as intrigued as I was by Paul Bannick's presentation in January about "The Owl and the Woodpecker"? On this trip, we'll visit burned areas of different ages because different species of woodpeckers are attracted to different post-burn ecological stages. ## Birds and Climate Change: On the move

**A**s reported in our March Quail, National Audubon Society has released a new study based on analysis of 40 years of Christmas Bird Count data. They found that nearly 60% of the 305 species found in North America in winter are "on the move," shifting their ranges northward. Below is one report of a species of local interest. ### Marbled Murrelet

The Marbled Murrelet is a bird of contrasting needs; it is a seabird, but breeds in both old-growth forests and on

rocky slopes. This yellow WatchList species is declining in the southern portions of its range (California, Oregon, and Washington) primarily because of the loss of old-growth nesting habitat; the species also appears to be declining throughout its range. Climate change poses an additional challenge.
