product every time! We truly appreciate her strong commitment to

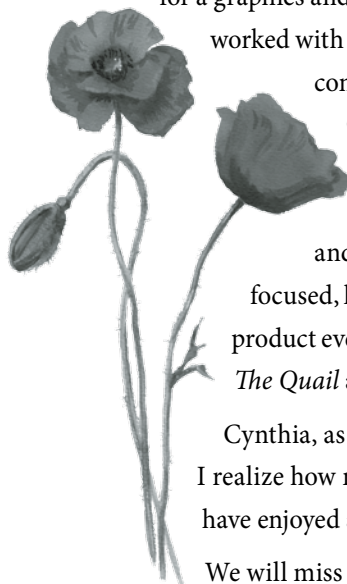

Lane Audubon is often asked to support the regional municipalities and agencies as they seek to increase and improve habitat areas. This article includes the summaries of several current conservation projects in the area, and we want our members to understand how Lane Audubon interacts with these agencies and groups. We are proud to be asked to participate in local conservation projects, and we are fortunate to live in a location where agency folks work hard to make area habitat improvements that we, as Audubon members, can support.

A newly formed stakeholder group for the **Siuslaw River Estuary Partnership Project** in Florence will discuss ways to protect and improve water quality as well as fish and wildlife habitat in the Siuslaw Estuary Watershed. The project's study area is a place of transition from land to sea that covers approximately 3,000 acres of terrain in the North Fork Siuslaw River area and the North Florence Sole Source Dunal Aquifer boundary. A proposed estuary trail would provide recreation opportunities for visitors to learn about the Florence area and its ecosystem. The stakeholder group will develop a report on trail designs and locations for approval by local officials. Additionally, the project will foster public education and stewardship, implement water monitoring programs, update the Wetland and Riparian Area Protection and Restoration Plan, revise

plans and codes for ecological growth, and protect high priority estuary wetlands.

Lane Audubon member Adele Dawson, who has lived in Florence for 30 years, is serving on the team to bring bird and other wildlife habitat awareness to the group.

The City of Eugene is applying for an Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board acquisition grant to help purchase 400 acres of oak savanna, oak woodland, and mixed oak-conifer forest in the Amazon Creek Watershed of Eugene's south hills ridgeline area. Other funding is secured with the help of The Nature Conservancy.

This project is part of the Rivers to Ridges vision, a conceptual Parks and Open Space Plan with multiple agencies cooperating in natural resource preservation. Lane Audubon has written a letter of support for this funding application since it remains a priority for our members to see this long-term project completed.

We are fortunate that our city supports this visionary plan for the future. Parks and open spaces provide educational opportunities for children and adults alike and are an essential part of the human habitat as well. Thoughtful consideration in the design of parks and open spaces can preserve bird habitat and ultimately bring people into closer contact with the natural world.

The City of Eugene is also creating the East Ridgeline Extension Master Plan with input from a Community Task Team of eight members that includes Lane Audubon's Dick Lamster. Over the past year, this group has conducted meetings, site visits, and public meetings to begin constructing the plan. Lane Audubon's interests are always to look for ways to maintain habitat in parks and open space. As they work to provide new uses for this East Ridgeline area, Eugene's city planners are also assessing the inherent values of the site that would allow visitors to have an educational natural experience as well.

Lane Council of Governments is working on the Willamette River open space system in and around the Eugene/Springfield area to develop a shared open space vision for this significant corridor. This plan will be used to guide major enhancements of this open space system in the coming years and decades and will address topics such as habitat, recreation, paths and trails, visual

Join the *Audubon in the Schools* teaching team!

What is *Audubon in the Schools*? In the tradition of John James Audubon and other great naturalists, we combine learning bird biology with art. Each of our lessons combines a multidisciplinary art and science experience for children in grades 2–5. *Audubon in the Schools* started teaching in the spring of 2005. Since that time, we've taught just under 6,500 students.

We're currently recruiting volunteers to become instructors for this educational program. We want to arrange the free training sessions for late July or August so folks can start teaching in the fall.

You don't have to be a bird biologist or an artist to teach this curriculum. We have both types of experts teaching with us now! We're interested in volunteers who love birds and enjoy teaching young children. You'll learn a basic drawing technique that helps children make accurate drawings while sharpening their observation skills. Each lesson includes information about bird biology and birds in our ecosystem. You'll use a teaching collection of preserved birds, feathers, bones, and nests. Our curriculum is structured so everyone has fun—student, classroom teacher, and our instructors!

How much time will it involve? The training involves two full Saturdays. Our aim is to have a large enough pool of instructors so volunteers commit to one visit per month. Each visit lasts one hour plus time to pick up the teaching collection, travel, and time for setup/breakdown at the school.

quality, public safety, and the urban interface. Lane Audubon has agreed to support this effort and become involved. For more information, visit the Lane Council of Governments on the web at www.lcog.org/willamette.

Lane Audubon was a cosponsor for the **Climate Crisis Working Group and Oregon WAND** (Women's Action for New Directions) Eugene event on April 7 called "Climate Change: What are Our Representatives Doing?" Among the nearly 100 people present were several prominent participants, including University of Oregon law professor Mary Wood,

who moderated the event; Eugene Mayor Kitty Piercy; Lane County Commissioner Pete Sorenson; State Representative Phil Barnhart; and Tim Ream, who attended the United Nations Climate Change Conference in Copenhagen last December. Our own Debbie Schlenoff attended with the *State of the Birds Report* from our April newsletter.

The efforts of these organizations are a positive reminder that important work is being done to preserve critical habitat for birds and other wildlife, and the support from citizens and organizations like Lane Audubon will only strengthen those efforts.

Volunteer opportunities abound with Lane Audubon

Each year at the Lane Audubon Volunteer Recognition party, as many as 80 attendees crowd the Eugene Garden Club to celebrate the accomplishments of the past year. These volunteers deserve much of the credit for Lane Audubon's long-standing reputation as the area's most effective grassroots organization in advocating for birds and the protection of their habitat. Every volunteer plays a vital role in making our organization strong.

We are always eager to welcome new volunteers into the fold. There are opportunities available for anyone with a little time and the inclination to help. We'll provide the guidance, training, supplies, and anything else you need to get started.

If you have an interest in joining other Lane Audubon volunteers or have special skills you would like to put to work in support of our goals, we'd like to hear from you.

Here are three specific areas where we currently need assistance:

Membership Coordinator

Help welcome new members by sending them thank you cards and information about Lane Audubon. Develop membership recruitment initiatives. Oversee our membership renewal program by coordinating postcard reminder mailings three or

four times a year. This position requires only a couple of hours a month and can be done from the comfort of your own home.

Lane Audubon Community Representatives

Lane County covers a lot of territory, and we have hundreds of members living in smaller communities beyond the immediate Eugene/Springfield area. If you'd like to introduce Lane Audubon to community members at local events in your area or facilitate their attendance at Lane Audubon field trips and program meetings, this is a great opportunity to get involved in community outreach.

Our outreach booth is on site at several fairs and festivals in the area each year. We have events coming up on May 8, May 16, May 29, and June 27. No experience is necessary; we'll match you up with an experienced booth staffer.



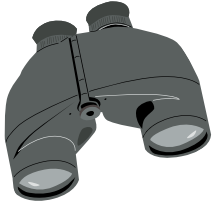
A special thanks

March was warmer and drier than normal, which has been the trend for much of this winter and spring. There were a couple of almost summer-like days later in March. Some of the early neotropical migrants are starting to return and most are arriving at their normal time. March produced a couple of exciting sightings, including a Gyrfalcon and a White-winged Dove. Both species have only been spotted a handful of times in Lane County.

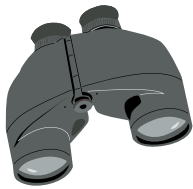
